About 80 schools are involved, and currently we bring about 1,100 students and teachers to campus for these events annually. Since my appointment as director, we have grown membership and attendance. Before my contract began, the spring 2013 event brought in fewer than 200 participants. However, the spring 2015 event saw the most attendance for spring in 11 years with 423 participants, and our fall 2015 event saw the most attendance for fall in 10 years with 670 participants. We broke this record again in fall 2018 with 709 attendees and fall 2019 with 720. Post COVID-19 lockdown, our numbers are returning, with fall '21 and fall '22 events bringing in around 550 each.*

  - In addition to directing this program, I also taught instructional sessions at each event
  - Partnered with Student Newspapers Online (SNO), a leader in online news publication services for scholastic and college media
  - During my six years of involvement, approximately 25 new scholastic online publications were created through this program

Funding ranges from \$20,000 - \$40,000 annually
  - OIDJ is an intensive weeklong summer camp for high schoolers from underrepresented populations, which started in 2004 as a mechanism to introduce minority students interested in media to Gaylord College and the university as a whole
  - Have served as director, co-director or assistant director of OIDJ since 2014
  - In addition to directing, I serve as a mentor to the high school students and teach sessions including profile writing, interviewing, news writing and graphic design
  - Funded with grants so there are no out-of-pocket expenses (a potential barrier for some), students spend a week on campus staying in the dorms, exploring campus and most importantly, experiencing a newsroom setting and creating their own media content which culminates on the news website: [oidj.org](http://oidj.org).
  - Continued virtually in summer 2020 and 2021 during COVID restrictions
  - Concerning the participants, OIDJ directors seek and give priority to students of color and those representing marginalized groups, and we also hire a diverse staff of college students, faculty members and journalism professionals to serve as mentors and teachers for the week. We recruit for this program both in and out of state.
  - With an attendance averaging about 16 students per summer, we frequently see students who have been part of this program go on to become Gaylord majors and student leaders.
  - In its 18 years, OIDJ has worked with more than 280 students representing a range of religions, ethnicities, sexual orientation, and socioeconomic categories.
  - Ethics and Excellence in Journalism Foundation, the Dow Jones Newspaper Fund, The Oklahoman, The Tulsa World, Oklahoma Living magazine, The Norman Transcript, and Oklahoma City TV stations KOCO, KFOR and News 9 have supported the OIDJ program with professionals, operational grants and in-kind donations.
